# Geopolitical and Security Implications of AUKUS on ASEAN

On September 15, 2021, Australia, the United Kingdom and the United States announced the formation of an enhanced trilateral security partnership called "AUKUS". While it has drawn support from US allies, it also met with criticisms from some ASEAN member countries.

Would AUKUS contribute constructively to the peace and stability of Asia-Pacific and complement the regional architecture, or spark an arm race and destabilize the regional peace and security of Asia-Pacific, more specifically the South China Sea?

How would AUKUS impact the geopolitical landscape of Asia-Pacific amidst the tense US-China relations, and in view that the ASEAN nations have always preached maintaining Southeast Asia as a "zone of peace, freedom and neutrality" (ZOPFAN)?

Is AUKUS consistent with the spirit of the Treaty of Southeast Asia Nuclear Weapon-Free Zone (SEANWFZ or Bangkok Treaty), which is committed to keeping nuclear weapons out of the region signed by all ASEAN member states?

The aim of NIAD 2021 is to provide a platform for scholars and experts on international relations and regional security to deliberate and exchange views on the geopolitical and security implications of AUKUS on ASEAN in particular, and the Asia-Pacific region at large.

A panel of 9 prominent scholars and academics from China, UK, US and ASEAN countries have been invited to the Dialogue to share their perspectives and insights on how AUKUS will impact the strategic landscape of the region.

Dr Xu Bu is the President of the China Institute of International Studies. He studied at Nanjing University, China Foreign Affairs University, Wuhan University and the Asia-Pacific Center for Security Studies, and graduated with a PhD in Law.

Served in Pakistan, the United Kingdom, the United States, Canada, ASEAN and Chile, Dr Xu has rich experience in diplomatic work. He had previously served as Deputy Director-General of the Policy Planning Department in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (2006-2009), Minister Counselor of the Chinese Embassy in Canada (2009-2011), Deputy Representative of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for the Korean Peninsula Affairs (2011-2015), Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to ASEAN (2015-2018), and Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to Chile (2018-2020).

Dr Xu has rich research experience in international studies. He has published articles in high quality academic journals, including Foreign Affairs Review, The Journal of International Studies and China International Studies, and published several articles in the People's Daily, Guangming Daily and Study Times. He is also the author of Say No to Wars: Comments on American Identity and International Politics and American National Identity and Its Impact.

### The UK's Changing Role in the Indo-Pacific

Rana Mitter is Professor of the History and Politics of Modern China at the University of Oxford, and Vice-President (Public Engagement) of the British Academy.

His work focuses on the emergence of Nationalism in Modern China, both in the early twentieth century and in the present era. He is the author of several books, including Modern China: A Very Short Introduction (2008, new ed. 2016), and the award-winning A Bitter Revolution: China's Struggle with the Modern World (2004). His book China's War with Japan, 1937-45: The Struggle for Survival (US title: Forgotten Ally) was named as a 2013 Book of the Year in the Financial Times and the Economist, was named a 2014 CHOICE Outstanding Academic Title, and won the 2014 RUSI/Duke of Westminster's Medal for Military Literature. His most recent book China's Good War: How World War II Is Shaping a New Nationalism (2020) was awarded the title Most Accessible and Captivating Work for the Non-Specialist Reader Accolade at the ninth edition (2021) of the ICAS (International Convention on Asia Studies) Book Prize.

Prof. Rana regularly presents and contributes to programmes on television and radio, commenting on contemporary Chinese politics and society. His television documentary "The Longest War: China's World War II" was broadcast on the History Channel Asia in summer 2015. His reviews and essays have appeared in newspapers including the Financial Times, International New York Times, Guardian, Telegraph, Caijing, and Outlook (India).

Mr Sourabh Gupta is Resident Senior Fellow at the Institute for China-America Studies (ICAS) in Washington, D.C. He is a senior Asia-Pacific international relations policy specialist with two decades of Washington, D.C.-based experience in a think tank and political risk research and advisory capacity. His key area of expertise pertains to the intersection of international law, both international maritime law (Law of the Sea) and international trade and investment law, with the international relations of the Asia-Pacific region. His areas of specialization include: analysis of major power relationships (China-U.S., China-Japan, China-India, U.S.-Japan, U.S.-India, Japan-India; Russia-Japan relations) and key flashpoint issues in the Asia-Pacific region; analysis of outstanding territorial disputes and maritime law-related developments in Asia; and analysis of developments in the World Trade Organization and Asia-Pacific investment, trade and economic regionalism-related policy and politics. He is a member of the United States Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia-Pacific (USCSCAP).

Prior to joining ICAS, he was a Senior Research Associate at Samuels International Associates, Inc., an international consulting firm specializing in government relations and global trade and investment matters, where he advised government and private sector clients. He holds master's degrees in security studies and international relations from the Walsh School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University and the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, Syracuse University, respectively. His bachelor's degree was awarded by the University of Mumbai.

GEN. Surasit is Director of the Thai-Chinese Strategic Research Center (TCSC), National Research Council of Thailand (NRCT) since March 2017, and Chairman of the Thai-Chinese Research Cooperation Center of Belt and Road Initiative (CTC). Prior to this, he has served as Director of the Strategic Studies Center, Superintendent of National Defence College, Deputy Commanding General, National Defence Studies Institute (NDSI), and lastly Supervisor to NDSI. He has also served as Military Assistant to the Force Commander of United Nations Transitional Administration in East Timor (UNTAET) and has been serving as the UN SSR Expert Roster, SSR Unit, DPKO, United Nations.

GEN. Surasit gained degree qualification in various fields of Military Science and Civilian Educations; among them are General Command and Staff Course from both Thailand and Germany, Thailand National Defence College, Master of Arts in Defence Studies from the Command and General Staff College Thailand, Master of Arts in Strategy and Policy from University of New South Wales, the National Defence Course and the International Symposium Course from the College of Defence Studies, CPLA, NDU, China, the Senior Executive Seminar Course 9-10 at Marshall Center, Germany, the LOGTEC Program for Senior Executive from University of North Carolina, USA, and Thai-Chinese Leadership Program from PKU & HQU. Prof. Zhu Feng is currently Executive Dean of the School of International Relations, Nanjing University. He is also Executive Director of the Collaborative Innovation Center of South China Sea Studies.

Prof. Zhu writes extensively on regional security in East Asia, the nuclear issue in North Korea, China-US military and diplomatic relations. As a leading Chinese security expert, Prof. Zhu's recent books include International Relations Theory and East Asian Security (2007), China's Ascent: Power, Security, and Future of International Politics (co-edited with Professor Robert S. Ross, Cornell University Press 2008), China-Japan Security Cooperation and Defense Communication: the Past, Present, and Future (Co-edited with Prof. Akiyama Asahiro, Tokyo: Aiji Press, 2011), and America, China and the Struggle for the World Order (co-edited with Prof. G. John Ikenbery and Prof. Wang jisi, MacMillan, 2015).

Prof. Zhu sits on a number of editorial boards of scholarly journals, consults independently for the Chinese government and the private sector, and comments frequently on television and radio as well as in the print media, on Chinese foreign affairs and security policy. Prof. Zhu began his undergraduate studies at the Department of International Politics at Peking University in 1981, and received his Ph.D. from Peking University in 1991.

Dr Kuik Cheng-Chwee is Associate Professor and Head of the Centre for Asian Studies, Institute of Malaysian and International Studies (IKMAS), National University of Malaysia (UKM). He is concurrently a Non-resident Fellow at the Foreign Policy Institute, Johns Hopkins University. Previously, he was a Postdoctoral Research Associate at the Princeton-Harvard "China and the World" Program.

Dr Kuik's research concentrates on smaller state external policy, China's foreign policy, Asian security, and international relations. He served as Head of the Writing Team for Malaysia's inaugural Defence White Paper (2020). He has held consultant positions at Oxford, Council on Foreign Relations, and Asian Development Bank. His publications have appeared in peer-reviewed journals and edited books. Dr Kuik's essay, "The Essence of Hedging", won the Michael Leifer Memorial Prize by the Institute of Southeast Asian Studies (ISEAS). He is co-author (with David Lampton and Selina Ho) of Rivers of Iron: Railroads and Chinese Power in Southeast Asia (University of California Press, 2020). His current projects include: hedging in international relations, elite legitimation and foreign policy choices, and the geopolitics of infrastructure connectivity cooperation. Dr Kuik serves on the editorial boards of Contemporary Southeast Asia, Australian Journal of International Affairs, and International Journal of Asian Studies.

Dr Rommel C.
