Synopsis (Suggested):

As East Asia enters the post-COVID era, countries and territories find themselves in an ever-evolving landscape that looks markedly different from the one they left in 2019. Unavoidable effects of the pandemic, combined with existing social conditions such as low fertility, aging populations, and changing family structures and formation patterns, are expected to present a series of imminent, multifaceted challenges to East Asian nations. The panel discussion aims to examine these challenges against the current landscape; compare prevailing geo-political, economic, social issues in China, Japan, and South Korea; and consider the impact these issues may have on the future of East Asia.

Session Plan

- [5 minutes] Moderator shall give an overview of the session and arrangement and the challenges faced by East Asians.
- [10 minutes x 3] Each panelist shall present 10 minutes on their background and research area as well as mentioning the pressing issue(s) in East Asia in their specializations.
- [~ 60 minutes] Moderator shall ask/moderate follow-up questions as below
 - 1. What are stumbling blocks?
 - 2. How could people collaborate better with each other in East Asia to face the challenges?
 - 3. What role Bai Xian Scholars could play?
 - **4.** What would be your advice for the younger generation who are challenged by the pressing issues
- [~30 minutes] Questions from the audience and off stage interaction (if any)
