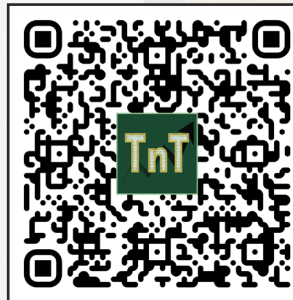


The Return of Donald Trump and its Implications for U.S.-China Relations
